Please feel free to make use of it during the day, either by contributing non-perishable items, or by taking any of the items for your own use, as appropriate.



#### Rev. Christopher Wharton 1934 - 2017



The Rev Christopher Wharton's funeral took place at St. Nicholas' Church, Harpenden on February 13th. Chris was a part-time 'Vicar' of Kimpton from 1993 to 2000. At that time Mike Carpenter, who now lives in Welwyn, lived at the Old Vicarage and recalls Chris's time in Kimpton.

"Fairly soon after we arrived in Kimpton Chris became our priest. He had a very difficult act to follow after Denys Graebe, but I have very good memories of Chris. I remember that he brought the Alpha Course to Kimpton which sparked something of a revival in the parish. He was a keen supporter of the extension courses that my wife Gay ran, in which, amongst others, 37 participated on their route to ordination. Chris was an avuncular and jovial welcomer of newcomers to the church. My recollection is that despite being unpaid and part time, he served the parish to the best of his ability.

We have good reasons to be grateful for his Ministry."



# Come and ring with us!

Sometime around 1390, William Burford, a bell founder from London, cast a bell, probably in the churchyard of the then small parish church in Kimpton. The Burford bell (believed to be the oldest in Hertfordshire) is still there and over

the centuries 7 more bells have been added. So we know that Church Bells have been rung in Kimpton for over 600 years. We can only imagine the number of hands that have pulled the ropes and how many services, occasions and weddings have been celebrated by the sound of the bells.

Bell ringing is a team activity, good fun and sociable. You don't need to be musical or strong as ringing is about technique and finesse and is within the capabilities of most people. It takes time to learn but once mastered is a life-long activity which opens the door to a network of friends and the opportunity to ring bells world-wide

Bell ringing is a tradition which is alive and well in Kimpton with an active local band. On the 5th March they hosted a Garage Sale to raise money for CLIC Sargent (a national charity that supports children and young adults with cancer) and Elizabeth's Legacy of Hope (a local charity that provides prosthetic limbs to children in developing countries.)

They were delighted to raise over £150 to be shared between Clic Sargent and Elizabeth's Legacy of Hope. The donation will be enough to provide one child with an above the prosthetic limb. From The Chair

In case you have not already discovered it, there is now a Facebook Group set up for the village. This is nothing to do with the Parish Council, but it is worth mentioning here as it has proved to be a very valuable resource, and an effective means of communication.

Covering everything from recommendations for local suppliers of goods and services, through to missing pets and suspicious vehicles and individuals, it is a very good way to keep in touch with what is happening in and around the village, and at the time of writing there are 800 members.

There are a couple of topics that have come up recently that have, directly or indirectly, involved the Parish Council: namely abandoned vehicles and dog mess!

For those who are aware of the vehicles in and around the village that have been causing the problem, it has been a frustrating and protracted process getting them moved. Unfortunately, the authorities, whether they are the Police or the District or County Councils, have a procedure to follow which is in itself somewhat convoluted. We managed to obtain a copy of the flowchart, which has been posted on the Parish noticeboard for those who may be interested!

I am aware that there has been some frustration over the speed of reaction to the latest incidents, which is understandable, but in cases where vehicles are not reported stolen, are taxed and hold valid MOT certificates, or are on private land, it is difficult to get them treated as a priority. You will be aware that neither the Parish Council nor the Neighbourhood Watch have any authority in these matters, and can only chase up the same organisations that you can.

On the subject of dog fouling, a number of residents have been adversely affected by the actions of a selfish few, so I would again urge everyone to behave responsibly, as the majority of dog owners in the village are perfectly willing to do.

The Parish Council provides (and we all fund, pet owners or not) a number of dog bins around the village, and we have just installed an additional one in response to these latest incidents. Please use them, and help to maintain the clean and safe environment that we would all prefer to be living in.

Residents who use the access road to the Parkfield Recreation Ground car park will have noticed the recent deterioration in the surface. This is despite two repairs in recent years, and we are trying to establish the best option for a longer terms repair, both in terms of cost and durability.

One issue that keeps arising is the fact that we have allowed the road to be used for the bin lorries to collect bins from the car park. This was arranged in response to problems in the High Street caused by the collections in Church Lane. Unfortunately, it seems that this solution has resulted in the rapid deterioration of the access road and, unless we want to be funding expensive repairs on a regular basis, we may need to review the situation.

Although less damaging, we are also aware that supermarket delivery vehicles use the road to gain access for delivery to nearby properties. Unfortunately this becomes an issue over the stewardship of public funds – it is not fair for the village as a whole to be funding road repairs caused by providing something of convenience to only a small number of residents.

We are currently considering what the best solution might be, but we are certainly going to be faced with at least one expensive repair, and we need to ensure that it lasts as long as possible.

#### Save time - Do it online!

North Hertfordshire District Council's website (www.north-herts.gov.uk) was awarded full marks last year in the annual survey of UK local authority websites. Only 44 out of over 400 council websites were given the highest rating of four stars, putting NHDC in the top 11% across the country.

One of the key features of the website is the 'Do It Online' function which means you can now apply for a service, report a problem or make a payment using this self service portal, saving time and effort.

The website which is designed to be more user friendly and easier to navigate, concentrates on the top tasks mostly used by residents. It has been optimised to bne viewed and used on tablets and mobiles.



#### **Being Mindful**

I have now had the pleasure (and pressure) of being the substantive village headteacher for over 6 months and what an experience it has been.

Finding the right school for your first headship is a decision involving a lot of research about the school, as well as gut feelings towards the place and the people within it. But I can honestly say that I am so pleased with the choice I have made. I now lead a group of dedicated and enthusiastic teachers and support staff to ensure the best possible outcomes for the children of Kimpton. The pupils are a joy and relish new challenges.

Together we have worked on our growth mindsets to be able to do anything we put our minds to.

Since joining at the beginning of the year we have all been working hard on raising the standards across both English and mathematics but along the way we haven't forgotten how important our own wellbeing and mindfulness is.

Together, as a staff, we have been learning all about the importance of mindfulness with Jane Wright (PSHE consultant) leading training on how we can use mindfulness to support our children and the different ways we can incorporate this into our everyday lives and our weekly school timetables. We kick started this initiative with our Feeling Good Week at the start of this half term, organised by Mrs Meiklejohn. It involved a number of groups and specialists from our own community including The Bench Boys, yoga with Heidi Shott and Anne Newby from Relax Kids. We also held a parent workshop to help parents support their children with their emotional wellbeing, with great feedback. Our Feeling Good Week was a great success with children seeing enjoyment in the mindfulness activities and as a result they have become more focused during core subject areas – a win, win!

We want to maintain the importance of this area to support our children in a society where mental health is key. One of these areas has been the introduction of the Daily Mile by Mrs Dunk and Mr Muir. Every class in the school aim to get outside for a run at least three times a week and we have not only seen fitness improving, but enjoyment and concentration as well.

Tying mindfulness together with our growth mindset, the whole school have been using the book The Beautiful Oops as inspiration to show that mistakes can be beautiful – it's all about how we look at them. Do pop in during the Kimpton May Festival to see the amazing artwork created by the children from an initial splodge, spill or rip.



As we now race towards Easter we look forward to the Mad March sale on Sunday 19th March (everyone welcome!) and then one of the highlights in the Kimpton calendar: May Festival. We look forward to all of the activities planned for 'At the Movies' which I'm sure will add to everyone's wellbeing.

As I sign off, I would like to thank everyone in the Kimpton community for being so welcoming and supportive during my first academic year. I look forward to sharing all of our news with you on our school website (www.kimpton.herts.sch.uk) and also in the next Parish Magazine.

The organisers of the Kimpton Folk Festival faced the daunting task of trying to build on the enormous success of last year's inaugural event.

It was suggested that everything could be moved onto recreation ground or other big open space "like other folk festivals". But part of what made the Kimpton event special was that it wasn't like every other festival. Laying on music and dance in the Memorial Hall, the Dacre Rooms, the church, the green and all around the village generated a sense that Kimpton was alive with music.

So the unanimous decision is that for this year's festival, on Saturday, July 1, we'll do everything exactly the same as last year...only better. In particular we've doubled our efforts to provide entertainment for all ages, spreading story-tellers, face painters and other family attractions into even more corners of the village.

And of course we have the most fantastic line-up of singers and musicians.

In the Memorial Hall, the top headline act will be Sam Kelly and the Lost Boys who are rapidly taking the folk world by storm. Among other star attractions are County Durham singer-songwriter Jez Lowe and his Bad Pennies and making a welcome return, Wild Willy Barrett's French Connection.

#### White Horse Update

In mid February our solicitor was contacted directly by the owners of The White Horse asking the community to make a full and final offer for the pub. The following week we submitted a formal written offer.

We understand from the Agents that four bids were submitted, all to operate the building as a pub. We emphasised to the Agents the importance of this point under the requirements of the Asset of Community Value. Subsequently one bidder withdrew.

After some further discussion, an offer from one of the other two parties was accepted by the owners, subject to contract. We have been contacted by that party and they are happy to engage with the community, but have requested confidentiality until the purchase contract is formally exchanged.

Any party that purchases The White Horse and operates it as a quality public house deserves our full support. Having spoken to the other bidder subsequently, it was the publicity generated by the community that lead them to bid for the pub.

It must be remembered that this stage of sale has been reached previously and completion was not achieved. We are therefore aware that we may have to re- engage with the process. To this end we have:

- •continued fundraising and at this time we have £430,000 pledged from investors, a formal confirmation of a grant of £30,000 from The Plunkett Foundation and an allowance for a matching loan of £30,000. Further grant requests have been submitted to 'Eastern Plateau' and 'The Big Society'.
- •We have completed formal conversion to a Community Benefit Society.
- •In January we undertook a full survey of the current state of the property that has created a better understanding of the extent of dilapidation to the property now that it has been through a second winter, unoccupied and without heating and ventilation.

At the time of writing, we anticipate that further information on the purchase should be known before the end of March. Many thanks for all the continued interest shown, and for your financial pledges.

#### Startrail photograph

Our cover photograph was taken by Simon Wallace of Melting Pot Pictures.

Simon explains how he captured the image.

"I use a Fuji XT2 - this shot had the 14mm lens attached - shutter speed was 30 seconds, aperture f.5.6 and ISO 1250.

I captured the image during the small hours - between 3 and 5.30am - on 21st January 2017.

The image comprises of 200 separate exposures taken across 2 hours - each exposure is 30 seconds and these are then stacked on top of each other in Photoshop, creating the trail. The movement is created by the earth's rotation so it is critical to try and get the pole star within the frame as this remains static and gives the illusion that the other stars are spinning around it. If you look closely, you can also see that I have captured the movement of the clock face - hence you can not see the actual time"

#### **Kimpton Public Rights of Way**

#### **Kimpton Bench Working Party**

We have been beavering away around the village as usual and I thought I would mention two jobs we have enjoyed doing. In February we helped the children at Kimpton School to tidy up their garden. We helped them dig over the vegetable beds, erect some sweat pea and runner bean wigwams, spread bark chippings on the paths, and paint some tyres in bright colours – for planting. Look to your left as you walk up the pedestrian path to the Memorial Hall and you can see their work in the school grounds. A very enjoyable morning.

We have also worked recently, for several Wednesday mornings, in the churchyard securing wobbly (ie dangerous) headstones and raising up buried stone grave surrounds. Many of the graves with surrounds that are, say, 100 years old, are disappearing into the surrounding soil. We

are trying to reclaim them before they disappear for ever. The job includes digging around them, raising them up, and filling in underneath with flint stones reclaimed from elsewhere in the churchyard. We sometimes find that there is a massive, grave size, slab of stone underneath that needs lifting too. This is typically a really heavy slate slab about 7 feet by 4 feet and two inches thick, and takes some shifting, as you can see from the photographs above. My theory is these hefty lumps of stone were put there to deter grave robbers from stealing fresh corpses to sell for medical research. As you can see it took three men with crowbars, extended by scaffolding poles, to lift this one.



The above are just two of the jobs we do, there are many more. For example, for the Parish Council, we are about to erect 10 MPH signs in the roadway to Parkfield car park and install a dog poo bin in Wren Close. Lots more jobs on the list. If you fancy joining us come along and see if you like it.

#### **Local Crime**

We continue to be a relatively low crime area which is most reassuring although there have been a couple of relatively minor crimes such as sheds/garages broken into and items stolen.

#### Abandoned Citroen Truck R 784 ANO

This vehicle, owned by a fencing company in Basildon, and parked in Commons Lane with a very unsafe and unsightly load for about 10 weeks was assumed to be abandoned and reported to NHDC and the police but the latter declined to take action as initially it was taxed and had a valid MOT.

It was NHDC's responsibility to trace the owner and have it removed which proved to be very lengthy procedure involving protocols laid down by Defra. Meanwhile despite efforts by the Parish Council and District Councillor, John Bishop it was not possible to circumvent the system. The ball had been set rolling initially by NHW Street Co-ordinator Robin Wells who badgered the responsible NHDC officer but with little effect and regrettably Robin was unfairly criticised by some neighbours for the lack of action, resulting sadly in his resignation from NHW.

Eventually the tax and MOT expired and the vehicle was removed presumably by the owner.
