

his parables – 'The Good Samaritan'. It is a story of great kindness by a stranger, but also of hypocrisy and lack of caring by those who should have helped. (Read it for yourself in Luke 10. 25-37)

And the conclusion he comes to is that EVERYBODY is our neighbour – everyone who needs our help.

#### **New Council**

The Parish Council has now established new roles following the recent local elections. Many thanks to the outgoing councillors: David Hardstaff, Donatella Pirola and Jon Palmer who between them have provided over 20 years of dedicated contribution to the community in serving on the council. It would be appropriate to recognise some of their achievements over the last year including the successful lobbying for faster broadband to the village, the introduction of websites for the village and a website of local trades and organisations, and the introduction of the first Kimpton Christmas Market.

We would like to welcome two new councillors: Carly Procter and Alex Firth; who along with myself Neil Burns, have joined the Council.

#### **Future Plans**

With the start of this new term the new Council is turning its focus to what the community needs to address over the next four years. Issues of traffic and parking have already been identified as of significant concern to the community. A 'Highways and Parking Working Party' led by Cllr Alex Frith has been established and options for possible improvement will be developed, leading to a consultation with villagers.

If parishioners have any ingenious ideas for improving the community or strong beliefs upon other areas that need improvement, your thoughts would be warmly welcomed. Please drop a note to the Parish Council Clerk on any item that might help to improve Parish life.

#### Village concerns.

In recent months several house burglaries, a vehicle break in and vehicle damage, and certain anti-social behaviour has occurred in the village. Discussions have already taken place with the Police, North Herts District Council and North Herts Homes (Settle) to explore further steps that might be taken.

Anti-social behaviour can occur in a wide range of forms from lighting a garden fire adjacent to neighbours' washing, to playing overly loud music late at night. We can all sometimes forget the impact of our actions upon others. It is important that we realise someone's life might be made very unpleasant by our actions and often a simple change to our timing can avoid such an impact.

#### **Parish Events**

A big heartfelt congratulations to the May Festival Committee and all those taking part in what many have said was "the best May Festival ever". There are many hours of time and tremendous effort put in by the volunteers and participants who come up with ideas and organise events that many of us are unconscious of as we enjoy the fruits of their labour. Many of those attending this year have given their praise of the weekend, with everyone having a view of the "most The village is very fortunate to have a number of community events held during the year including Kimpton May Festival, Kimpton Folk Festival, Kimpton Horse Show, Kimpton Autumn Show and Kimpton Christmas Market. People from outside of the Parish often comment that the community's willingness and spirit to take on such ventures makes it stand out noticeably from other villages.

The Parish Council is very pleased to support and participate in these events. Over recent years an increasing amount of equipment has been obtained and these are available for formal Parish events. The inventory includes marquees, gazebos, chairs, tables and a commercial water boiler.

This year marks 100 years since the end of World War 1 and on the evening of Sunday the 11th November 2018 the Nation is holding events throughout the country to mark the start of the peace gained by our forbears.

Cllr Sue O'Brien and Cllr lan Corbett are working with The Royal British Legion and various other village groups to provide an event in the centre of our village.

# A message from your MP Bim Afolami

When I was elected as your MP in June last year, I could never have imagined how much my life would change in such a short space of time. Being a Member of Parliament is like no other job in the world, but its uniqueness makes it so incredible. And I am incredibly fortunate to represent the wonderful seat of Hitchin and Harpenden, including some of Hertfordshire's most lovely villages.

A lot of people ask me what it is like to be an MP, and what I get up to everyday, so I thought I would take this opportunity to give my constituents a taste of what I do in an average week (although each day is different to the next!).

I generally spend Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday working in Parliament, and the rest of my week in the constituency or with my family. Balancing family life can

be tricky when you're away from home so much, but I am very fortunate that my constituency is close to London.

A huge part of my role as an MP in Westminster is being part of the Public Accounts Committee, which I am very privileged to be a member of. The role of the committee is to scrutinise public spending, and make sure the taxpayer is getting value for money. The committee is very important, and is what Parliament is really about. The circus like atmosphere of Prime Minister's Questions isn't representative of the real work that goes on behind the scenes, and it gives people the wrong impression of what the world of politics is like!

After a busy few days of meeting, media and debate, I head back to the constituency. There are a number of really serious issues affecting Hitchin and Harpenden at the moment, including concerns about train services, Luton airport expansion, and worries about the Green Belt, but I also find time to do some slightly more relaxing activities!

Recently I went to Kimpton Primary School, to give an award to the amazing Yvonne Matthews, who has taught there for 20 years. Yvonne was recognised as the best teaching assistant throughout all of the East England region. She is so well known and respected in the villages, and it was a joy to visit the school and give her the public recognition she deserves.

I also hold surgeries in the constituency, which gives constituents time to meet with me personally to discuss their concerns. I receive a huge number of emails and letters from constituents, but meeting people face to face gives us a chance to really get to the root of the issue. These surgeries are a key part of my week, and I think allow politics to make a real impact on peoples' lives.

It can be tiring and hectic sometimes, and I know every MP says representing their constituency is the best job in the world, but I think representing Hitchin and Harpenden is a hard job to beat!

### John Otway and Wild Willy Barrett at Kimpton in November

Looking ahead, we have two absolute music legends coming to town on Saturday 3 November -John Otway and Wild Willy Barrett. In their heyday, these guys were known and loved the world over.

Perhaps their best known album is the one simply entitled

John Otway and Wild Willy Barrett.

Recording began with a series of sessions at Pete Townshend's Eel Pie Studios in which The Who guitarist contributed as an arranger, producer and performer. Townshend produced the first two Track label singles by the duo, "Murder Man" and "Louisa On a Horse", which were included on the album.

A third single, "Really Free", reached No.27 in the UK charts in December 1977 after the pair performed a set live on the BBC TV show The Old Grey Whistle Test. The performance was notable for an incident in which Otway vaulted on to a PA tower and overbalanced. The Independent reported: "He brought down the speaker stack but fractured no bones when he landed on the sharp corner of a bass cabinet, as the impact was cushioned by his private parts."

Polydor reissued the album after signing the band in 1977. The Allmusic website rated it seven out of 10, describing it as a patchwork collection that "dances on a peculiar precipice somewhere between folk and country, pop and pub rock".

# A Maritime pilgrimage

Back in February 1944, my godfather, Rodney Bowden, was a young Sub-Lieutenant on a destroyer, HMS Zambezi. The ship had just completed one of the dreaded arctic convoys to Murmansk in Russia, when she was directed to race back round the North Cape of Norway to the island of Soroya, to pick up Norwegians.



These people had just survived the harshest of winters hiding in tiny caves on a bleak island after they had escaped when the German army had burnt to the ground their town of Hammerfest.

HMS Zambezi, along with two other destroyers, rescued 520 people, who were taken to the Shetlands.

This February, my wife, Juliet, and I joined a Hurtigruten ship coming south and we called at Hammerfest, which is now a thriving town once more.

We told our story to the lady at the museum, where

there is a display about this incident and she kept on saying 'Thank you, thank you!' – not only for what my godfather and his ship did, but also for coming back to tell the story.

A man standing behind us overheard and took me to one side. "My father too was there at that time", he said. "He was a Medical Officer on the German battleship 'Lutzow'"

It was a salutary reminder that there are two sides in any war. We agreed that war was no way to solve the world's problems! *Andy Morton*

A sustainable approach has always been at the centre of the Plot 31 plan so they grow without chemicals, limit single use plastics and reduce, reuse, recycle where ever they can. After many months of preparation - digging, sowing, weeding and watching, Plot 31 are ready to start getting their fantastic flowers out there for others to enjoy so watch out for them at local markets and events.

The flowery growing space is open to the community and volunteer gardeners enjoy working together to produce stunning crops.

The folk at Plot 31 have long been advocates of the therapeutic benefits of gardening but now it seems there is a wealth of evidence out there to support the idea that it can do wonders for your physical health and mental wellbeing gardening is officially good for you! Make your property looks 'lived in' by parking a vehicle on the drive and installing timer operated security lights. Give a neighbour your contact details. Don't leave **any** keys within sight of an open letter box. Our free Letter Box Deflector prevents 'peeping toms' having a quick look and a poke with a grabber. Please let me know if you would like one.
