#### Finding hope - Vicar Bonnie's Christmas message

Frosty mornings, stacks of firewood and the nights drawing in signal yet another turning of the season. A golden Harvest has come and gone. And in the Remembrance Sunday parade and service, held in dignified solemnity, the village once again demonstrated its long history and connection with soldiers of the past and respect for those serving in armed forces today. We have entered that calm before the festivities leading up to Christmas, with events happening every weekend. Carols and decorations are in the shops already.

It is said we are as a society moving away from consumerism and in search of something that gives meaning, a sense of the holy, of being a part of something bigger. Surveys have shown

that the favourite television show amongst the under 35s is the Great British Bake-Off – a show that celebrates ordinary people, not behaving badly as in the show Big Brother, but in showing off their baking skills and the regard and care they have for one another. It is said there is a growing search for re-enchantment, a search for the spiritual, by those previously rejecting traditional religion, and a search for holiness in the world by those previously confined in religious silos.

It is said that churches have a habit of sticking to themselves, of keeping themselves separate from the world. And that unworldliness can be interpreted as a lack of concern for those around us – but our youth group is holding us to account in their concern not only for the good of the village, but for society in general. They have raised money for charity, helped out at a food bank and, this month, are raising money for Azalea, a Luton-based organisation helping homeless women. Again this year they are making a film to be shown alongside the children's Nativity play to be held on Christmas Eve afternoon. It feels important to mention that wonderful collection of snuggle packs for refugee children by Megan too.

Christmas is a time when the birth of a child brings a message of hope to humanity, a child born in a stable to parents seeking refuge from oppression. It comes at a time in the year when the season turns yet again – days start to lengthen and we await the warmth of Spring and new life. In the passion for justice amongst the young, and that childlike sense for sharing, we foresee a better world on the horizon, or even a world made better in the here and now because there are such generous hearts among us. In the depths of seasonal darkness, we find hope.

BLAST is busy preparing for its annual nativity play and would love to welcome more children to take part. We are looking for shepherds, wise men (or women), sheep and any other species who would like to join the stable. We have great fun rehearsing on Sunday mornings at Church house from 9.30 and the children (and parents) also get involved in creating the set. Do


come along if you would like to take part.... no experience necessary!

As I said in a recent post on the village Facebook group, the members of our Artists' committee go and watch a lot of performers (a tough job, but someone's got to do it) and they deliberate long and hard about who they think you'll enjoy most. Then they do the hard negotiating to ensure we can actually afford them.

These people do a fantastic job - I'm sure you agree - but this year they've outdone themselves. As I write this, the full line-up is still being finalised, but I can tell you about our headline act 'The Urban Folk Quartet'. This is one of the most in-demand acts on the national folk scene for good reason; they're musicians of the highest calibre and they're incredibly dynamic and energetic, in a 'blow your socks off' Sam Kelly & The Lost Boys kind of way. Check out the video on our website www.kimptonfolk.uk. Tickets will sell quickly, so if you're interested, make sure you hop in as soon as these go on sale – we'll keep you posted via our social media updates.

In my last report here I mentioned that Kimpton Folk Events is a registered charity, with a broader remit than just staging a folk festival.

We have one group, for example, that is working with schools and community groups to nurture young musical talent and we have started running a series of 50-minute 'popup' concerts in The Dacre Rooms. In the new year, after the restorations, you can expect to see us presenting some very exciting young musicians at these events.

Ahead of Kimpton Folk Fest 2018 we'll be running two fundraisers - the Kimpton Barn Dance on March 24, and a very special concert featuring an act many of you already know and love. This event hasn't been finalised yet, but we're looking at a date in May and we'll keep you updated. The Barn Dance band this year will be made up of young people from the village - and we're very excited about that!

The festival is on Saturday July 7th.

#### A new academic year

I can't believe that I am already in my second year of being the headteacher within our village and continue to be amazed by all of the wonderful opportunities this community offers our young children. The summer holidays seem a blink of an eye ago and already I can hear Christmas carols being sung around school.

If you follow us on twitter (@Kimpton\_Primary) you will have noticed over the summer holidays how our children engaged in The National Trust's 50 Things to do before you're 11 3/4. A list



which reminds me of my childhood. I recommend everyone to revisit their childhood and carry out some of the activities on the list – you could even tweet the school with your pictures!

At the school we are continuing to strive to be better, to improve in all areas and build upon the success of the previous year. I can't emphasise enough how lucky I am to be working with staff

who hold the children at the centre of all they do and support all the initiatives and ideas to make our school the best it can possibly be.

#### **Early Years Quality Gold Mark**

One such success from last year is one from our Early Years Team. For the whole of the last academic year the Early Years team (our Nursery and Reception teachers), along with the SLT focussed on improving writing outcomes for our youngest learners. We improved the provision



both indoors and outdoors; the team provided workshops for parents and incorporated further opportunities for mark making and writing in all areas of their day. The Herts for Learning team commented that: "The real strength of the school is the commitment to teamwork and the focus of the leader in seizing opportunities to improve the provision for the children in their care The team have created a stimulating and exciting

learning environment, embracing the independent learner. The provision they have created has had a positive impact on the outcomes for children."

Both Mrs Hairon and Mrs Dunk worked extremely hard to achieve this wonderful award and I know that they have left this legacy in our early years to build upon this year.

#### **HLTA** of the Year

As I'm sure everyone in Kimpton knows, we are extremely fortunate to have a wonderful staff team at the Primary School who are dedicated to ensuring that our pupils receive the best possible education whilst they are with us and that they are then ready for the challenges which lay ahead in secondary school.

Some of our staff go above and beyond in their roles to support their colleagues and pupils; making our school a rich and vibrant place because of them. One such person is our very own Mrs Matthews. She has been at the school now for over 20 years, supporting over 400 children in that time and it is really nice to see that all of her hard work is being recognised. On Thursday 14th September we were honoured to welcome our local MP for Hitchin and Harpenden: Bim Ofalami for an extremely special occasion. We had nominated our very own Mrs Matthews for the National HLTA of the Year Award and were thrilled to find out over the summer holidays that she had won the Eastern region. The award; the reason for a special



assembly and why Mr Ofalami was visiting was kept a secret from the whole school. Everyone was present in the hall when Bim Ofalami arrived in school and he talked about why he had been invited - to have a special role in presenting an award to a member of our staff for their continued hard work, commitment, continuously positive outlook and always looking at how she can support our children more. He told the children at Kimpton about the hundreds of

entries that there had been in each region and how special this award was. To see Mrs Matthews face when she realised that we were talking about her, was priceless. She didn't recognise how much we all appreciate her and was speechless. It was such a lovely moment in school.

Once Mrs Matthews had recovered from the shock and surprise of receiving her award she wanted to share the following message with everyone in school and the community: "I have been totally overwhelmed by all the kind words and messages from parents and children both past and present on receiving my recent award. I am still in shock, proud and totally humbled." On Monday 20th November Mrs Matthews will be attending the award ceremony to find out who is the national winner of the HLTA of the Year award. We wish her good luck and hope she enjoys being in the spot light – she deserves it! We know that no matter what the outcome; we are a very lucky school to have such an amazing member of staff and she will always be a star in our eyes!

As Christmas draws near, I look forward to seeing many of the local villagers at our carol concert on Thursday 14th December as well as at the Kimpton Village Christmas Market at the beginning of December. Have a lovely Christmas and I look forward to sharing many more exciting developments in the next parish magazine.

Our thanks also to the Parish Council, the Police and North Herts DC.


At the War Memorial on the 11th there were about 50 people, and thanks to Vicar Bonnie for officiating at the short service and laying a Wreath on behalf of the Church.

Thanks for your suggestions for routes for our planned walking maps. They should emerge some time in the new year. We are aiming at just a selection for the (quite small) paper version, but we plan to back them up with more walks and information online. So I'll be happy to continue to hear of your favourite walks.

The new County Council maintenance contractors again did a pretty good job in the summer and autumn. But I am aware that it took quite a while to reinstate some crossfield paths after the recent ploughing, harrowing, drilling and so on. The 'rules' are that farmers have 2 weeks after ploughing to reinstate paths - and just 24 hours after other processes. We know that they are often operating under considerable pressure and we would rather be friendly and co-operative, so we try to be flexible. But it might be just an oversight sometimes, so please let me (or Tom, see below) know of any that have dragged on way beyond these times.

Please continue to let me or Tom Goldsmith, (tom.goldsmith@hertfordshire.gov.uk), Countryside Access Officer at Herts. County Council, know of any problems like overgrowth, damaged gates, obscure or damaged signs or waymarks, obstructions and so on.




become leaky, we have repaired the roof, laid some now flooring, cleared out all the rubbish, installed some shelving, so it can now be used by village organisations such as the May Festival,

OWL continues to expand and now is linked to approx.11,000 properties who receive crime alerts direct from the police throughout the County and North Herts.

#### **Local Crime**

We continue to be a relatively low crime area which is most reassuring although there have been reports of shed and garage break ins.

#### **Latest Alerts**

The police advise that the current threat is from gangs of Pickpockets and Dippers in the run up to Christmas. You are most vulnerable whilst shopping.

Keep zipped, don't get dipped!

A new scam involves an illegal immigrant claiming to have won a substantial Lottery prize which, due to their status, they can't claim. They ask you to claim it on their behalf for a share of the winnings providing you put up surety such as money or jewellery. Guess what happens next!

#### **General Alerts**

There are continuing threats from the international problem of Cyber Crime so be especially mindful of the dangers and how to combat such as fraud and identity theft scams. Do note the police advice on the OWL website and in particular the September update from the Herts Constabulary Crime Reduction & Community Safety Dept.which can be accessed via.Herts.police.uk/Protect your Money.

Subjects covered include

Missed delivery cards from Royal Mail Student Loans Fraud Most commonly reported scams on over 60's Do you sell items on line and/or use Paypal? Protect your Pension Safety Tips for Students

Don't get involved with 'computer experts' claiming to have diagnosed a fault on your machine if you give them certain personal details.

#### **Nuisance Phone Calls**

Still ongoing unfortunately so if your blocker isn't working or you haven't got one and you don't recognise the caller or the number just put the phone down.

#### **Distraction Burglaries**

Please keep an eye on the elderly and those living alone and advise them to be extremely wary of and challenge unexpected callers, if they can't provide identity evidence don't open the door.

Always ring the police on 101 to report your suspicions. If the caller is persistent and/or aggressive ring 999 immediately.

#### **Caring Neighbours**

Please check on elderly, vulnerable and neighbours living alone and in particular remind them not to engage in conversation with any dubious phone caller or doorstep visitor. If in any doubt tell them to put the phone down and then call the Police immediately on 101.

#### **Night Security and Absence**

With the onset of the festive season in mind if you intend to leave your property unoccupied please secure all windows ,doors, garages and sheds. Your property will look 'lived' in by parking a vehicle on the drive and installing security lights. Give a neighbour your contact details.

Don't leave any keys within sight of an open letter box. Our free Letter Box Deflectors prevent 'peeping toms' having a quick look and a poke. Please let me know if you would like one.
