New Beginnings

‘A Traditional Christmas’ – that’s what we often say we want. Presents round the tree, turkey and brussels sprouts, tinsel and Carols from Kings on Christmas Eve.

It’s so tempting simply to pull Christmas out again from the drawer we shoved it into last January, dust it off and sit back contented, with the door firmly closed.

For many people, it’s all they can do, with work schedules over-burdening them right up to the last moment.

But perhaps this year is an opportunity also to pause and to reflect.

For the Parish Church, it is something we have to do, no matter what. With Vicar Bonnie now gone to Liverpool, we are busy preparing our Parish profile to attract a new Vicar, and we have to face some very fundamental questions. What sort of place is Kimpton? What is the role of the Church within the village? What type of person would we want as our Parish Priest?

Bonnie made us feel uncomfortable. She confronted us with many difficult truths about the world outside Kimpton. And that is part of the role of Parish Priest. Kimpton is a cosy little village, which tends to look inwards on itself, rather than outwards towards the world. We are a caring community, but is that care simply for the community, or do we consider the needs of people beyond the parish boundary?

Recently, I was shown an Alternative Advent Calendar. It suggested that, instead of being given chocolates or booze each day in Advent,

we could collect food items each day to be given to the Food Bank at The Oval in Harpenden at Christmas.

Is there a way to make Christmas mean more this year, by looking outwards and making our celebrated caring for those within the village be transformed into caring for those outside it who need our help?

Babies are still being born in squalor, as Jesus was. People are still being refugees, as Jesus was. People are still being unjustly accused and killed, as Jesus was. Perhaps, in our Christmas, we could spare a thought for them as we remember him!

Kimpton aiming for world music domination!

We're really sorry about all the emails, texts, Facebook messages, posters, flyers and general nagging to buy tickets....but in case you hadn't already noticed, the organisers of Kimpton Folk Festival are busy trying to turn the village into the musical centre of the known world.

Since July's hugely successful third festival, the Kimpton Folk Events charity has organised sell out concerts in the Memorial Hall, church and Dacre Rooms and is planning many more exciting events. Arrangements to make next year's Folk Festival the best ever are well in hand. In a slight departure from the core folk scene, November saw the arrival in Kimpton of the musically insane duo John Otway and Wild Willy Barrett, best known for their big 70s hit, *Really Free* and a host of near misses.

Wild Willy is already much loved in Kimpton for his appearances with his French Connection band, but concerts with John Otway have become increasingly rare.

The capacity Memorial Hall audience was treated to the madcap antics by John Otway and dead pan humour and brilliant musicianship of Wild Willy Barrett, offering everything from bare-chested theremin playing to wah wah wheelee bin solos.

A highlight involved the sawing in half of a guitar while Wild Willy was still actually playing it. The remains of the guitar were later signed and sold to an adoring fan. It was that kind of night. By the time you're reading this Nancy Kerr and James Fagan, the headliners at our very first Kimpton Folk Festival, will have recorded their new live album at Kimpton parish church. They are pictured above at the recording session.

James and Nancy have become official patrons of Kimpton Folk Festival and will be appearing again at next year's event on Saturday 6 July 2019, both as a duo and as part of the folk supergroup Melrose Quarter which also includes fellow folk couple Jess and Richard Arrowsmith. Other big names already signed to appear include Edgelarks, Megson, Alden, Paterson and Dashwood and The Misshaped Pearls. You can be sure we will be shouting about these and other top acts very soon.

And we can also announce that there will be a strong dance theme to next year's festival, with plans for bop until you drop concerts, dance groups performing all around the village as well as our usual ceilidh finale on the green. So bring your dancing shoes.

But there's more. Continuing the successful run of monthly pop-up concerts at the Dacre Rooms, on Friday 11 January 2019, there's a chance to hear the close harmonies and moving songs of June Swift and Peter Michael Rowan.

On Saturday 2 February 2019, the brilliant Churchfitters, whose quirky, multi-instrumentalist approach to folk music defies categorisation, will be appearing at the Memorial Hall.

Meanwhile we continue with our outreach work, spreading music to the young, the elderly, the lonely and others who might benefit. A new project will take music into schools for children with special needs, preparing and encouraging them to take part in activities at next year's festival.

So apologies again for all the endless trumpet blowing and nagging to buy tickets....but we're not going to stop any time soon!

A Housing Needs Survey is being distributed throughout Kimpton on the 4th February 2019 and will result in an overview of our current affordable housing need.

I would ask you to respond, whatever your situation and whatever your opinion is: Whether you are for, against, in need of, or know someone else in need of housing, please take the time to complete the survey.

I appreciate that some may have concerns about any new housing, but if a need is established through this exercise, we hope that the housing provided would be for local people connected to the Parish. These homes should then, subject to changes in government policy, remain affordable and for the use of local people in perpetuity.

Kimpton and the Incinerator

I am sure many of you are aware of a proposal (by a company called Emsrayne) to build a large incinerator on the Lower Luton Road just outside of East Hyde. I fully understand the detrimental effect this will have on Kimpton as well as Harpenden and the other surrounding villages. From the start I have been strongly opposed to the proposal and will continue to fight it. Putting an incinerator there would lead to hundreds of HGVs clogging our small rural roads, high levels of air pollution in an area already blighted by Luton Airport, and other negative environmental effects. It is a bad idea.

Emsrayne Ltd were due to put forward their application in September but, as of mid-November, they have not put forward any proposal. I think this delay reflects the huge opposition raised by all of you against the plans; opposition that I have tried

to amplify as much as possible. They underestimated our resolve to stop this incinerator ruining our local area. This passion and determination will prove vital for the future. Unfortunately, whilst they are yet to put forward their proposal to Central Bedfordshire Council, their delay does not mean this issue has gone away. They are likely to make the application soon.

The Stop Harpenden Luton Incinerator (SHLI) group have done a wonderful job in raising awareness, organising volunteers and continuing to increase support for the cause. Last month SHLI and I met with Grant Schapps, MP for Welwyn & Hatfield to discuss our fight against the incinerator. Grant fought an eight-year battle in his constituency against Veolia who put forward a similar proposal which was defeated in 2016. His advice offered all of us a great deal of insight into how we can organise ourselves more effectively moving forward.

We do not want this incinerator. If Central Bedfordshire Council are foolish enough to approve it, I will ensure that the decision is called in and considered by the Secretary of State – and will make the case that it should not go ahead.

You are more than welcome to contact me at any time if you wished to discuss this matter or get an update.

I wish all of you a wonderful Christmas period and look forward to visiting Kimpton soon.

We are always open to new ideas and would welcome anyone who would like to be involved in this role and any improvements that could be made.

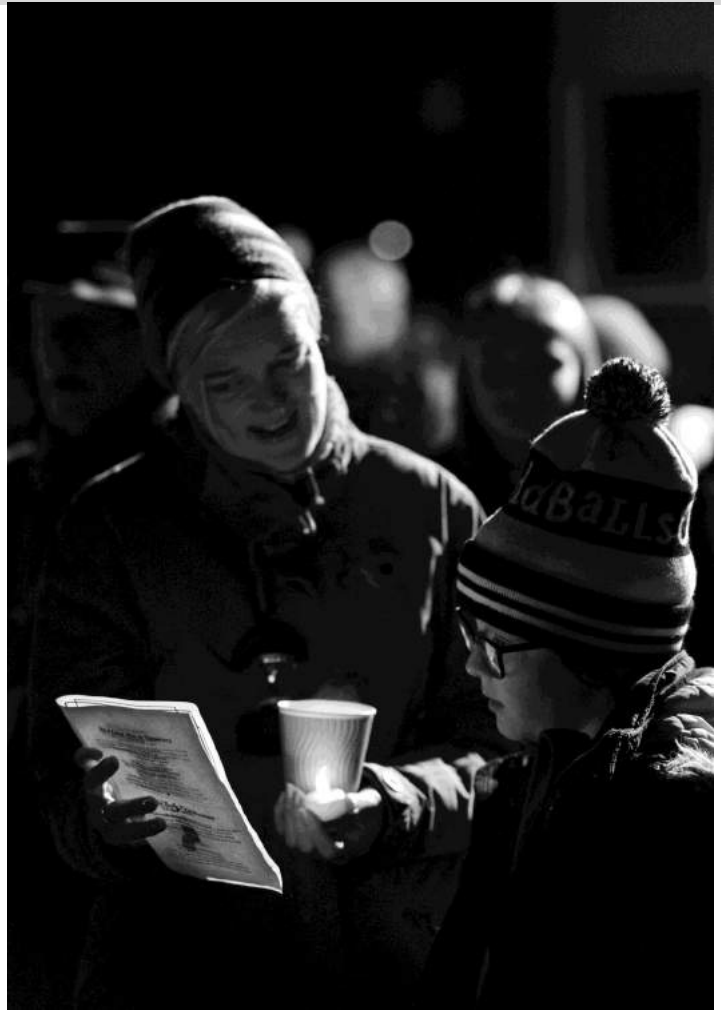

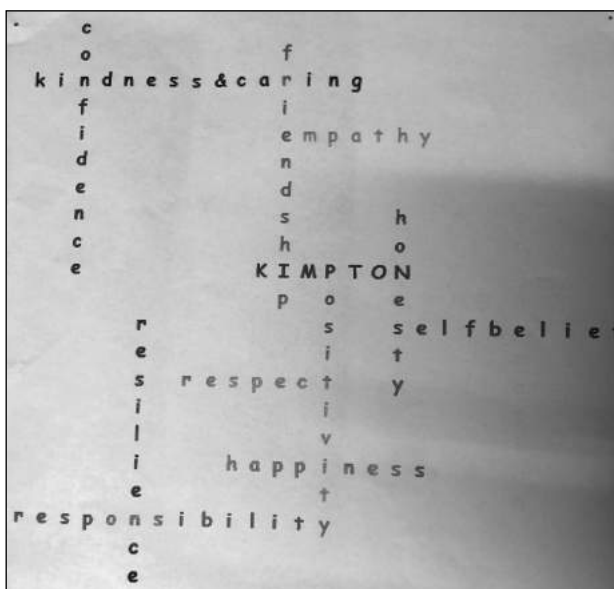
spotlight on a member of staff so that everyone can get to know our staff team.

One area that we have been focussing on this term is our behaviour – both learning behaviours in the classroom as well as the behaviour that we show around school. We decided, as a staff, that as a result we wanted to change our Behaviour Policy to reflect our new approach. Our new policy is driven by having a positive approach and basing our PSHE on 12 Kimpton Values. We want all of our pupils to leave as good citizens, ready for the next step in their learning journey as well as having the confidence to make the right choices when no one is looking.

Mrs Dunk is our PSHE subject leader and is also our behaviour lead. She started by introducing the 12 values to the children through an exciting catwalk. This grabbed their attention and gave the values momentum from the beginning. Already we can see that pupils are valuing one another by the choices they are making as well as highlighting their peers for hub points when they see someone demonstrating one of our values.

Each half term we are focussing on two of our values through assemblies, hub group activities as well as our star of the week awards. There is a real buzz around school about these values and each hub is motivated to do well as a team to earn collective points. This half term we are looking at Confidence and Respect.

Royal British Legion, Kimpton Branch

As this year was the Centenary of the ending of hostilities of the first World War, and Armistice day fell on a Sunday, it was convenient that we remembered and celebrated two occasions in one day.

The Remembrance Sunday Parade and Church Service, and the evening Beacon event were both a great success and very well attended.

The weather for the day was in our favour, and we would like to thank all the village organisations, the Parish Council, Police and North Herts DC for controlling the road closure, also thanks to Harry Grey our Parade Marshal for keeping us all in order, and especially the young groups and their leaders and parents for the part they played in the Parade and Church service. This year, we decided to have some light refreshments available in the Memorial hall before the Parade set off. This was organised by Kim Hills, who with the help of some kind ladies made this worthwhile.

Wreaths were laid by the Ladies and Men's Branches of the Royal British Legion, the Parish Council, the Police and the Church, followed by the very young girls and boys who laid 44 Poppy crosses on the Memorial in memory of the men of Kimpton who lost their lives in the two wars.

At our British Legion AGM on the following evening we had a good turnout of members.

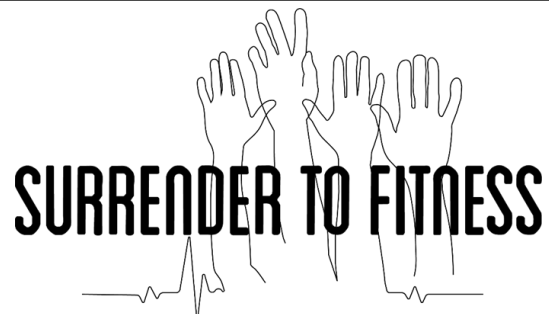

How to make a hedgehog friendly garden

British Hedgehogs are in decline and need our help! We only have around 700,000 left and this figure is generally on a downward trend throughout the UK. It is rare to ever see a hedgehog in cities these days and they are almost gone from London. The suburban towns and villages are a safe place for hedgehogs. We've heard from residents in Kimpton there is a small population. One of which has taken up residence around the Church Green area.

How about making some small changes to your garden that would help entice a hedgehog to visit you and perhaps even stay over this winter? If you can check off any or all of the following, you will have a hedgehog friendly garden!

- ***Don't use slug pellets or pesticides.***
- ***Have at least one 13cm hole in any fencing along you boundary.***
- ***Put out some hedgehog food and water in a shallow bowl.***
- ***Close off any open holes such as drains or ditches which hedgehogs could fall in to and not escape.***
- ***If you have a garden pond or pool make a ramp or a way for the hedgehog to escape should it fall in.***
- ***Obtain and place a suitable hedgehog home or box for hedgehogs to nest in and even hibernate in.***
- ***Plant fruit trees to help attract insects which also provide food for hedgehogs.***
- ***Hang out some insect habitates on trees, fences, and walls.***
- ***Seed some wild flowers in your garden.***
- ***Pile up leaves, create stacks of wood or logs, or start a compost heap.***

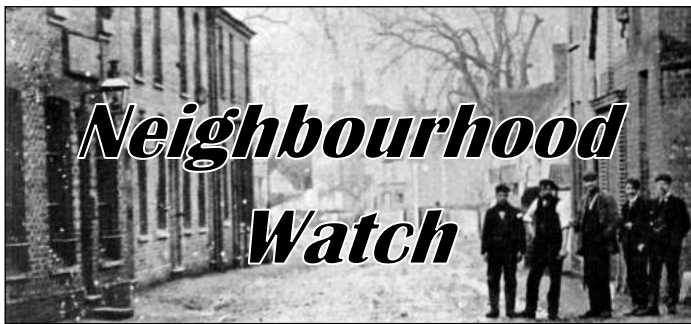
Ultimately a messy garden is the type a hedgehog loves! Try not to make it too perfect. We have an online shop and sell lots of hedgehog goodies such as homes and food specially created for hedgehogs. We also sell insect habitats and lots of different wildlife foods. We also offer a free local delivery service. All income generated through our shop is used to help the hedgehogs.

Hornbeam Wood Hedgehog Sanctuary helps hedgehogs in the local area. We look after hedgehogs that have no place to roam, have managed to find themselves in precarious situations, are ill or injured. We look after them until they are fit to be released. We fatten up underweight hogs who arrive at the sanctuary during the autumn/winter months so they are ready for release in the spring. We also tend to young hoglets during the spring/summer months who have lost their mothers or been

Neighbourhood Watch

Be aware of these scams!

For the benefit of those residents not receiving OWL crime messages direct from Hitchin police I would draw their attention to the following.

With Christmas in sight please keep a lookout for suspicious vehicles or persons who could well be "casing the joint" with a view to future action. Ring 101 with descriptions of vehicles and/or persons.

Don't be fooled by a telephone call pretending to be from HMRC saying they have an arrest warrant in your name for unpaid taxes and they need your bank details.

Similarly a call or email from BT or Microsoft saying your internet is slow and they offer to help which involves downloading some software onto your computer. Then they're in!

Also villains have ways of getting access to your Bank details, either by telephone or email, so don't give any personal or bank information to an unsolicited caller. Put the phone down and never click on an email link.

Fraudsters are able to port your mobile phone details to a SIM card which they control and use it to access your bank account and help themselves. Always keep one step ahead!

The wonderful Victorian building that is the Dacre Rooms has been part of our community for almost 140 years.

Lady Dacre was the wife of 22nd Baron Dacre and the granddaughter of the 4th Duke of Devonshire. She was a Lady-in-Waiting to Queen Victoria, indeed attending her at the coronation in 1838, and mixed in the highest echelons of society and the political classes. She was, however, a firm believer in temperance and the value of education.

So, with the twin aims of providing an alcohol-free environment for socialising and an orderly place for working men to become aware that education could improve their lives, Lady Susan established the Working Men's Institute in 1879. It was known colloquially as "The Reading Rooms". Over the years that have followed the building has seen many other uses; the British Legion has rented it, it served as a small factory during the Second World War, and finally it was home to the Kimpton Youth Club for several decades before that ceased to operate. Slowly, the unused Rooms began to deteriorate until, five years ago, its future was in significant doubt.

In 2014, a poll of residents suggested that refurbishment of the Dacre Rooms as a community venue was the preferred option and a hard-working group set about organising fund raising events to rescue matters. Grants from North Herts District Council, Kimpton Parish Council and Kimpton May Festival enabled urgent remedial work to take place. By 2017, more ambitious plans had been developed to refurbish the Dacre Rooms and to transform the venue into something fit for the 21st century. NHDC agreed to fund the majority of the project alongside further generous support from the Parish Council and the May Festival. Work began in January this year and was completed in April, on time and on budget.

On 27th September we hosted a tea party to celebrate the renaissance of the Dacre Rooms with our supporters and friends. We were delighted to be joined by so many of you, including a number of representatives from the district and county councils. We received a letter of thanks from NHDC, which I believe sums up the success of this project rather succinctly. "It was truly an exceptional day and my my, what you and the team have achieved is something really special, not just in Kimpton but as an exemplar for others to try and attain throughout the District & villages.....".

As a recently appointed trustee, I take little personal credit for the hard work that the team has put in, but they have clearly done a great job. I am extremely grateful to everyone who has helped in any way to make the refurbishment of the such a success for the village, and I wish to record my thanks to all of you publicly. I include in my thanks the many of you who are using the Rooms.
