September; A new start?

September is perhaps too strongly aligned with starting-over, new school year, fresh starts and clean sheets (as in paper nor

bed). That's all ok provided we made neat endings. For you can't have new beginnings without good endings. To paraphrase the well known saying; don't put off until September what you could finish by July!

I admit to dashing madly from unfinished job to half-done task the minute through the Summer. Every household job I'd promised to give more than a 'lick and a promise' to in the vicarage and garden, reared up before me reproachfully. The stuffed crammed in the cupboard on moving in day that was promised it would be sorted, the pictures still to hang, and the overgrown outdoors. What for some are holidays stretching endlessly out in 'do nothing' days, for me are 'catching up with practical task' days! There is a lot of satisfaction for me in switching off my head and working with my hands, whether it's clearing out, sewing, drawing, (hacking back the greenery with a hedge trimmer is wonderfully therapeutic).

One September I started full-time study abroad at the grand old age of 49. I was away from home for five months. One consequence of that was learning to let go, to put down, to leave behind whole sections of my life; the housework, (yippee you say) paid employment, (not so great!) my local church and all that rushing and dashing from job to job. Suddenly I realised what a fast pace my life was lived at. Indeed it was frustratingly difficult to find every minute was not activity filled! Ultimately I came to realise what a gift I had been given, what a door had been opened before me ...the gift of time to focus on simply studying theology. I was able to switch off my head, stop worrying, rushing, failing to be superwoman! But those 'do nothing days' were busy with reorienting myself onto the really vital task of being the person God created me to be.

Now much as I'd like everyone to experience the wonder and joy of leaving the household chores (and perhaps the husband and children too) behind, I realise that it's an impossibility for most of us. I treasure the memory of those five months, because among myriad other things they taught me to recognize when I was overloaded. When I was distant from the centre of myself. Then it was time to make an end some of the things, switch off my head and, in my case, re-orient myself God-ward, in even the simplest of things...such as working with my hands.

Re-orienting or re-centering ourselves in even the simplest things we do is an important priority for the new start afforded by this September 2019. Try your hand at something you haven't tried before-maybe sewing, painting, gardening, reading that pile of books you promised yourself you'd read---maybe even coming to church one Sunday morning. There are a few good Sundays this Autumn: Harvest on 6th October, Remembrance Sunday on 10th November, Christingle on 1st December and all those Christmassy times.

At a recent church service we spent time together putting down things we'd been burdened with, each of us writing them down, screwing up that paper and leaving it at the foot of the cross in church-with Jesus. Then we took away a red paper heart to keep reminding us God's love for us and of the importance of making good endings and starting new beginnings. Whatever you decide to do – treat yourself to time to switch off, make an end to something you don't want to do and do something new just for you this Autumn.

In her younger days, Dora worked in Luton, typing reports for the Police Force. She married Ernest Scott, (Ernie;1919-2004), and they became proud parents of four children; Judith, Andrew, Susan and James. After the birth of the children, Dora returned in 1972 to her former employment.

Dora was an active person! She was often to be seen cycling to and fro in the village; as a member of the Pool Club, she would cycle to Pool House and back, swimming widths in between! She thought nothing of walking to Whitwell and back, always at a fast pace! People would say, "Blink, and you'll miss Dora!"

A committed member of Kimpton Church, Dora was a longstanding choir member, a bell ringer, and also rang handbells at Christmas carol services. She regularly read lessons and led prayers, where she always included words about the natural world and the loveliness of Kimpton and its surroundings; the birds, flowers and animals.

Dora was a positive, cheerful person who was never afraid to speak her mind!

She was a very kind person, who was always ready to help others. Part of her daily routine was to clean at Kimpton School and she also assisted with weekly cleaning at the Vicarage. At the preview night of the May Festival Art Show she could be found at her post, washing up!

Dora travelled extensively; she loved Scotland, especially the Isle of Skye, but she also relished visiting far-flung countries and continents; her maxim was always, "See as many places as you can while you are able".

She had a great respect for the Monarchy and loved Royal occasions – indeed she once camped out on the London streets overnight, in order to get a good view of the spectacle! The annual Harrods Sale became stimulus for further exciting visits to the metropolis!

Dora, née Offer, moved to the village as a small Dora always showed interest in the welfare of other people; she was thrilled to have eleven grandchildren and a great-grandchild and to hear their news, and beyond the family, she greatly enjoyed chatting to Kimpton villagers; she regularly attended the 'Loaves and Fishes' lunch at the Boot and the coffee mornings at the Dacre Rooms.

From the Chair

Crime

A meeting was held in Kimpton Memorial Hall on 17th September to discuss rural crime. The meeting was led by David Lloyd, the Police and Crime Commissioner for Hertfordshire and Bim Afolami, our local MP.

The overall level of crime in our community remains very low; however, this is of little comfort to those who have personally experienced it.

The most numerous crimes in rural areas remain thefts from outbuildings, sheds and farm buildings, antisocial behaviour, domestic abuse, house theft, and car theft. Cyber-crime including telephone banking scams is a rapidly increasing area of risk to rural communities.

Policing is a more complex matter now compared to 50 years ago. The days of a full time local 'Bobby' living and working within the village have gone. Specialist units deal with differing types of crime and the sharing of information between neighbouring police forces is made far more use of. The reporting of all crimes by the public is extremely important. Political decisions are driven by statistics so please always report incidents, whether it is a theft or noticing that fly tipping has occurred on a country road.



Kimpton Environmentalists Collecting and Donating!

Hardly any apples in Kimpton village this year! Having excelled themselves last year, most of our trees must have been hit by frost. Luckily, we have had a couple of generous donations of picked apples from the Hoo and the High Street, plus invitations to pick just out of the village. It means there are far fewer bottles of Kimpton Apple Juice this year, so get your orders in quickly!

The profit from the sale of last year's juice and this year's May Festival Kimpton Trail has been donated to local causes: £50 to Butterfly Conservation, £75 for the Parish Magazine to be printed on recycled paper; £75 to CPRE Hertfordshire (Campaign to Protect Rural England); and £100 to the Woodland Trust.

Thank you to everyone, including the local pubs, who has helped in collecting plastic tops from milk and soft drink bottles; and crisp packets, biscuit and cracker wrappers. Already over 5 kilo of bottle tops have been taken to Lush in St Albans, for recycling into tubs and counter-tops. The wrappers have been sorted and, again, about 5 kilos sent for recycling. This translates into over 2500 crisp packets and 1000 biscuit wrappers, earning us around £33 to be donated to Kimpton Parish Church Restoration Fund. Let's keep up the good work, saving plastic from landfill while making a small contribution to the upkeep of our beautiful Church. Remember there are recycling points at the Church and the Dacre Rooms. moment we don't want any other sort of tops or packets, no jar tops or crisp tubs etc. If anyone take collecting wants on further "recyclables" (See www.terracycle.com/en-GB) and wants some help, please contact me or Robin: 07979 996406


Theft of lead from the Palladian Church roof

Some of you may know that Ayot St Lawrence's "Palladian Church" suffered a theft of the lead roof covering the northern (i.e. nearest to KImpton) colonnade in the early hours of the morning of 29 August. We think the thieves approached across the field from Bibbs Hall Lane and targeted this section as it is more secluded than the other side. The irony is that the church was awaiting the installation of a roof alarm with motion-triggered cameras: by the time you read this it should be in place. Given that the police advised that the thieves might well return to strip more lead, a team of volunteers has been sleeping in the church since it happened so that the alarm could be raised: both villagers and friends of the church from Harpenden, Welwyn and St Albans have joined in this task, which has proved an interesting experience. Indeed, a book club has taken up the challenge and is hoping to write up their tales! Perhaps the church has another potential role here, and one that might generate some revenue: "DareBnB" anyone? And who knew that our church loo would prove so useful.....

The church is planning to replace the roof very soon with lead but using different fixings: whilst there are lead substitutes available, getting permission to use them on a Grade 1-listed building is time consuming. This work should be completed before the winter frosts set in to prevent damage to the columns beneath.

Whilst the church is hoping that their insurance will cover the bulk of this work, they will have to pay for some of it. Ayot St Lawrence is a very small place with only 35 houses and some 100 people so the church hosts many events to supplement income. Please do try to support us in these: they are very high quality, often professional musical or theatrical productions.



Cholesterol Awareness Month

October is National Cholesterol Month and is dedicated to raising awareness of cholesterol. We need cholesterol in our blood to stay healthy. Cholesterol keeps your body's cells intact and it is also converted in the skin to vitamin D which is important for bone strength. However, when you have too much cholesterol in your blood it can be a problem. High cholesterol over a period of time can lead to heart disease. The only way to know if you have high cholesterol it is to get a cholesterol test. There are 2 types of cholesterol in the blood - LDL cholesterol which is bad and HDL which is good.

Women naturally have higher HDL cholesterol levels than men. Women should aim for an HDL cholesterol level above 1.2mmol/L while men should aim for above 1mmol/L.

What raises your bad cholesterol? Your blood fats – your cholesterol and triglycerides – can become raised for a number of reasons.

For example:

A diet which is high in saturated fats Not being active enough, so the fats aren't used up for energy

Genetic conditions which mean the fats aren't processed in the usual way.

If your cholesterol is raised, there are treatments available if you need them but it's usually possible to lower cholesterol naturally with healthy lifestyle changes.

A cholesterol check involves a simple blood test. When you get a check, your doctor should also check your levels of triglycerides – another type of blood fat. A cholesterol test can be used along with some other simple tests to give a good idea of your heart health. These include a blood pressure test, finding out your BMI (Body Mass Index) and your waist measurement.

What's more, there are another 7 ways you can prove a connection to the churches here in order to get married in them—including, for example: having been christened here and coming to church regularly for 6 months. We like to make it possible for you to have your wedding in our churches if that is your heart's desire.

Second, Kimpton's beautiful Grade One listed 14th century church is steeped in history. Set in its own picturesque, well-kept grounds with superb views across the countryside as a backdrop.

Imagine walking down this long aisle on your wedding day! Beats a lot of bare office rooms.

And you can order bells to be rung as you go.

Third, did you know that Church weddings could be much cheaper than you think? They start at just over £500 (in 2019) for the venue, notice of intention to marry, ceremony, vicar (who presently is the registrar for the day), certificate and verger (who keeps people out of the church during the ceremony and looks after your guests seating arrangements). By contrast you could pay up to £800 (in 2020-1) for a Registrar led ceremony depending on day, date, time and circumstances.

Fourth thing: Whilst your wedding ceremony may take about 40 minutes to an hour, the venue is open before and after for family and friends to gather and those all important photos afterwards. No rushing and 'no-wedding-waiting outside' conveyor belt feeling with a church wedding.

Our MP Bim Afolami hosted a meeting in the Memorial Hall on 17th September to

Although very few residents attended there was a useful exhange of views and attention was drawn to the scheme to compensate victims of crime, called Beacon, Google Mapping of hotspots and police visits to schools to highlight drug abuse and gang violence. There is an App. now available to allow you to photograph incidents of Fly Tipping with co-ordinates of the location and hopefully details of involved vehicles.

Keyless Vehicle Theft

With the increasing number of these vehicles in use villains have more opportunity to gain access to and steal your car using so called "booster relays" which enable them to connect your key to your vehicle even if some distance apart. It might help if you store the key in a metal box or wrapped in foil to shield it from any unwanted signal. As far from the parked car as **Absence** possible.

Vehicle and Contents Theft

Countywise there has been a marked increase in these crimes so always lock you car and set the alarm and don't leave Satnavs or Dash Cams on display.

Similarly a bogus call from BT saying your internet is slow and they can help by your downloading some software on to computer if you provide bank details.
