We've learned to live with change, which has been very difficult for some and a nasty surprise for others. Normally we'd enjoy a good complain about change. Instead, we might marvel at the changes we have lived through during this pandemic. One example-who would have thought almost 50% of us would have submitted to vaccination with a brand-new vaccine we'd never heard of!!

But for followers of Jesus, 'CHANGE' is our middle name! Jesus came to challenge the 'way it's always been.' Every moment of his ministry is about change. Jesus' disciples

struggled to understand what all this change was about. As Jesus led them towards the end of His time on earth with them, so they began to get it. He led them to Good Friday...but also to Easter. It led to His seeming incomprehensible senseless death ....but also to new life, eternal life and abundant life as they had never know it before. It needed CHANGE for that transformation to happen.

Following Jesus means being open for a transformation; open to change our ways of doing things. For us now, we'll have to accept the challenges, even the deaths of some things, the growing pains, which *will* come as the regulations are eased and life returns to some kind of normal. We all hope to be able to soon do more and do it safely—but we may well be doing it differently than before.

Remember that many people will find their lives have changed beyond anything they could have imagined in their wildest dreams. People are mourning loved ones they never thought they would not have the chance to say farewell to. Jobs, businesses and livelihoods have been wiped out. Five million are waiting for delayed hospital appointments or procedures. Many, me included, remain anxious about being in large crowds. Corona virus will be with us for a while yet. We may need annual jabs. We may have further lockdowns. One thing is certain, we shall be obliged to come to terms with CHANGE, with a new way of being and living.

Christians believe that God is with us in all of this. Faith in God can help us embrace this new way, this change because we see God there in the help and support that so many in these villages have freely given to those around them. God is in the initiative of Kimpton Cares. God is there in the doorstep chats and the walks around the Rec and the 'Hellos' across the street. In the face of all the CHANGE we have struggled with, the good news is that God will not leave us but will always support and sustain us. That's why it was so important to continue to respond to God's presence and keep our churches open for most of the pandemic so that we might be there for all. Join me as we come together, Sunday by Sunday, to be nourished ready for the next unexpected step in our journey with the Lord of CHANGE.

# From the Chair

#### Recent changes on the council

There are three recent changes at Kimpton Parish Council to update you on. Firstly, at April's meeting we welcomed Ben Purple as our newest parish councillor, having filled the vacancy by co-option. I'd like to thank Cllr Lewis Hawke, the outgoing councillor, for his service to the parish during his seven-year stint on the council, during which he also served as vice-chair.

At May's council meeting, which by a quirk of scheduling fell only a week later, I was elected chair for 2021-22, following Cllr Neil Burns decision to step down from the role. Neil was elected straight into the role when he joined the council three years ago, and has done a sterling job. I'd like to thank him for his leadership and personal contribution, in particular on planning issues and in pushing forward the affordable housing agenda. Finally, I'd also like to thank Cllr Alex Firth for accepting the role of vice-chair for the upcoming council year.



#### The Butt End of..?

Those of you out and about recently may have noticed the council has put up signs denoting 'Butt End Path' (pictured), which runs from the Hitchin Road to the top of Church Lane. By doing so, we are reinstating the name of an historic footpath as recorded on various old plans. The origin of the name remains a bit of a mystery, but one plausible explanation is that a 'butt' is the name farmers give to an awkward shaped corner of a field, which certainly fits the description of a nearby field. Thank you to Cllr Jon Marsh for arranging this on behalf of the council.

#### Time for a trim?

The persistent rain in May followed by June's warm spell has brought a welcome growth spurt for local vegetation. However, a few residents have advised the council this is now encroaching across pavements meaning that pedestrians, particularly those with buggies and dogs, have to step on to the road as they pass by. With this in mind, if your property is adjacent to a public footpath or pavement, please can I ask you to ensure these are kept clear.

#### **Greening Kimpton**

We held the kick-off public meeting for this campaign on Zoom in late April and it was great to have so many people in attendance. By way of a reminder, 'Greening Kimpton' is a community-led initiative that aims to support local people and businesses in reducing energy consumption and waste, helping create a healthier and happier future for us all. We'll launch the full campaign in earnest in September, to give us time to engage with local groups and organisations from across the community and establish the role they can each play. We're also actively looking for people of all ages, backgrounds and different shades of "green" to join our working group. 
May 15<sup>th</sup> was the centenary of the Royal British Legion. Sadly, due to Covid rules, we were unable to hold a Remembrance Ceremony but myself and Robin Wells (Our President) laid a wreath on behalf of the village.


The RBL was formed in 1921 because after the First World War, Britain's ROYAL BRITISH LECION economy plummeted, leaving 2 million people unemployed. Over 6 million men had served in the war. Of those who came back, 1.75 million had suffered disability and half of these were permanently disabled.

On 15th May 1921, the British Legion was formed, bringing together four national organisations of ex-Servicemen that had established themselves to support those who had suffered as a result of service during the First World War. Later that year the poppy became the symbol of remembrance and the first appeal that year raised £106,000 (equivalent to £5.21m in 2021) and 2,500 branches of the British Legion were established across the country. The following year the Legion's Poppy Factory opened in the Old Kent Road, London where 40 disabled men manufactured 1,000 poppies a week. The first Festival of Remembrance was held at the Royal Albert Hall in 1927.

Good news!!- we have been informed that the Festival of Remembrance and the Remembrance service at the Cenotaph this year should go ahead in November having been cancelled last year due to Covid. We have applied for Keith Dollin – our Standard Bearer- to represent the village once again at the Royal Albert Hall. I will keep you posted on the progress of that in the next magazine.

The Parish Council recently granted our application for funds for the cleaning of Kimpton War Memorial. This is quite a task undertaken by a sandblasting company and will be completed in the first week of the school summer holidays to ensure that the surrounding school area is not affected Kim Hills (07901 605383), Chairman, RBL (Kimpton Branch)







#### The Future of the Palladian Church?

Simply put, the future of the Palladian church depends on the villagers taking ownership of the church and responsibility for its governance. Whatever options the future brings, the building will need input from more people to keep going.

This church building is unique -- literally the only one in the world by Nicholas Revett. It attracts visitors and walkers all year round. We are trying to capitalise on this by offering it as a

unique wedding venue, a unique artist's opportunity, a site of scientific interest via God's Acre mapping.

#### A new Future as Festival Church?

The Palladian Church plans to be the first Festival Church in the Diocese of St Albans. This means:

Monthly church services structured around Christian festivals to include a mix of prayer and the sacraments alongside concerts, drama, activities for all ages, crafts and food. For instance: the Easter garden competition for children with recycled resources—prizes of chocolate eggs-naturally! Our June service includes taking part in the 'Love your burial ground's' Churches count on nature-where we'd like lots of families to come up and count the flora and fauna in individual marked out squares of the churchyard.

Your village church stays open! You will still be able to have Christenings, Weddings and funerals there as well as Art Shows, concerts and Christmas carols.

We want increased use of the church as a venue to hire and for village events. It is the one village public space. So, need a space for something? Just ask.

In many ways the Palladian Church has evolved into festival church over the last few years. Plans have been severely impacted by Covid-19, but services, Christenings and weddings are taking place. Obviously, this is the route we'd prefer to go down and hope you will agree it's a great move for the Palladian church.

To secure this future there are two vital things which must be achieved:

**Governance of the church** needs to be on a secure footing. This means the church council needs more people. We have no Wardens and only 3 formal members. More people will be needed to help with joint village and church events.

**Funding of the church** needs all the help it can get. Covid-19 lockdown has meant no fundraising at all. I have had past years' outstanding church contributions to central church, which we could not pay, written off. This has given us that clean slate and reduced the annual precept to £4k

#### Any Future as parish church?

If the Festival Church concept fails, the Palladian church cannot continue as it has in the recent past. In that event there are two possibilities:

**Closure.** If there is no clear desire for the mission and ministry of the church in the villager, then the Palladian church would close. This remaining village community building will be lost. Services will no longer be able to held there.

**Chapel at Ease.** This option means the village passes governance of the Palladian Church to Kimpton Church Council. Often when this happens a 'Friends of the Church' groups takes on the maintenance of the building.

I hope you will join with me in not wanting the Palladian Church, your church, to close. Our church's situation will be reviewed in 2022.

## Tree Planting Benefits Kimpton - says MP Bim Afolami

Over the coming years, I am committed to offsetting the carbon footprint from my duties as your Member of Parliament by planting hundreds of trees across the constituency. Tree planting is hugely beneficial for our local area in so many different ways.

These native broadleaf trees will each sequester 1 tonne of carbon dioxide during their lifetime. They will also boost biodiversity by offering new habitats for an abundance of wildlife and our essential pollinators. Trees are also excellent barriers against flooding, mitigating flood risk and securing riverbanks from erosion. Soil erosion is a monumental problem in the UK, but trees help to sustain

the natural biome of the ground and replenish its nutrients. These trees will also bring significant benefits to our community health and wellbeing – improving our already green and luscious areas for us and future generations to use. Speaking of future generations, the creation of community assets like village orchards or school woodlands also contribute to protecting the green belt from future development.

In the Spring of this year, I began the pilot phase of my constituency tree planting with 400 trees planted across the constituency. In Kimpton, I was pleased to work with the excellent Parish Councillors and their volunteers, spending time with Bob Finch and the Working Bench Group. Working with local community champions is the best way to identify the most suitable planting spots, whether to replenish hedgerows, improve community spaces or start a village orchard. The trees were provided in partnership with The Woodland Trust, and I am grateful to them for their advice and assistance from the outset.

I hope that this planting scheme can continue to benefit our local communities – both in Kimpton and across the whole of our constituency. Local Authorities, particularly Parish Councils with land in their portfolio, are very well-placed to take large numbers of trees with their knowledge of the local landscape and residents' views. I hope to maintain these partnerships for further planting later in the year when the tree-planting season begins again.

#### Please take time to read the issues below affecting personal, vehicle and property safety.

#### **Local Crime and Safer Neighbourhood Policing**

The last few months have been relatively quiet, but there have been incidents relating to scams, motor vehicle theft, theft of property from motor vehicles and some drug possession.

lif you are a victim of, or a witness to, an incident which you feel is serious enough, do report it immediately to Hitchin Police Station using 101 and ask for a Crime Number.

Our Hitchin Rural officers are Ward Constable Gary Pugsley and PCSO Heather Burrows who can be contacted via the automated control at County HQ on 01707 354192 or use the e-mail addresses inside the back cover of this magazine.

#### **OWL (Online Watch Link)**

We want more of you to join the growing numbers of residents benefitting from receiving police crime alerts direct by e-mail or telephone. Hertfordshire OWL membership is currently 162,000 but we want to increase that so please tell your friends and neighbours about it and urge them to join. Contact <a href="https://www.owl.co.uk">www.owl.co.uk</a>, our Ward Coordinators (listed below), or our Watch Liaison Officer Verity Soued on <a href="https://www.owl.co.uk">wlo@herts.pnn.police.uk</a>.

It is important that we keep records up to date to maximise the benefit of NHW within the community. We are always looking for Street Coordinators to each cover a small number of houses. They will maintain the details of new households and amendments as well as keeping an eye on any vulnerable people who also may not have access to OWL on the internet.

#### Scams continue to be a big problem. Typical ones in circulation today are :

- 1. Scammers posing as Police Officers/Staff/Banking Officials.
- 2. HMRC monies owing or refunds
- 3. Dating websites Romance scams. Exploiting vulnerable, lonely members of our society
- 4. Spoof emails asking you to click on links
- 5. Post office/courier texts demanding payment for wrong postage. This is a double scam. Payment is demanded to redeliver a parcel. A few days later the victim is called by a scammer purporting to be from their bank, telling them they were victim of a scam (which they were). As this is true the victim believes them and potentially parts with further money via a Push Payment.
- 6. Virgin Media network and account issues
- 7. Amazon prime accounts
- 8. Courier Fraud when a victim (often elderly or MH concerns) is contacted and told they need to move their money as they have been subject to a scam/investigation. They arrange to meet with that individual to collect money they take out of the account. With large unusual payments or requests to take money out of a branch, the Banking Protocol will be enacted by banking staff whom inform the Police of potentially fraudulent activity
- 9. Covid 19 Vaccinations a) people offer to arrange a Covid vaccine for a fee. Only the NHS has access to vaccines and will never ask for money. B) Fake NHS text and emails telling people that they are eligible for the Covid 19 vaccine. If you click on the link you will be taken to a convincing NHS website that asks for personal and financial details. There is a Crimestoppers Covid Fraud Hotline set up by the Government in partnership with Crimestoppers to enable individuals to report within the public sector during Covid. **The Hotline is 0800 587 5030**

None of the above organisations send e-mails asking you to click a link.

#### **Keyless Vehicle Theft – protect your vehicle**

Always lock your vehicle. If possible, park your car in a locked, alarmed garage. Check regularly for software updates for your car and keep your vicinity key in a signal blocking pouch. Criminals also employ remote keyless entry jamming equipment; so ensure your car is locked before leaving it by trying the door handle and checking the indicators flash. If possible switch the key signal to "off" (check the manual or ask your dealer). For additional security fit a steering wheel lock (e.g,Krooklock or Stoplock) and/or an approved tracking device, which will help police recover a stolen vehicle.

#### **Vehicle and Contents Theft**

Countywide there has been a marked increase in these crimes so lock your car and set the alarm and don't leave any valuables, Satnavs or Dash Cams on display.

There is an outbreak of catalytic converter theft particularly from Hybrid cars, even in daylight, where the thieves profit from the sale of the precious metal content. Take special precautions such as parking in a garage or close to a wall, fit CCTV to your home, have fixing bolts welded or fit a dealer supplied security cover. It is also possible to etch or forensically mark the converter and use a windscreen sticker to deter thieves. Hertfordshire Constabulary has teamed up with garages around the county to offer free catalytic converter security marking. Details of the garages taking part in the security marking scheme can be found at <a href="http://www.herts.police.uk/operationfeline/">http://www.herts.police.uk/operationfeline/</a>. The marking takes around two hours.

#### **Seasonal Security Reminders**

As lockdown eases and we are free to move about it is important that you secure all windows, doors, garages and sheds if your property is unoccupied. Do not post holiday dates on social media and only upload holiday photos on your return. Make the property look 'lived in' by parking a vehicle on the drive if possible and installing timer operated security lights and give a neighbour your contact details. Never leave any keys within sight of an open letter box

### **Shingles Vaccine**

Did you know there is a vaccine that helps reduce your risk of getting shingles and reduces the severity of symptoms if you do develop the disease?

#### Shingles:

- is a common disease that can cause long-lasting severe pain
- has been known to cause permanent disability
- occurs more frequently in those over 70 who are also more likely to have worse symptoms

#### The vaccine:

- is significantly reducing the number of cases
- will reduce the severity of symptoms in vaccinated people if they develop the disease
- cannot cause shingles in healthy people
- you will only have the vaccine once you do not to be re-vaccinated every year
- is recommended even if you have had shingles before.

You become eligible for the shingles vaccine as you turn **70.** The vaccine is also available for those previously eligible (currently in their seventies) but who missed immunisation. People aged 80 years and over are not eligible because the vaccine becomes less effective as people get older. However, if you turned 80 in the last 12 months and missed out on the vaccine due to the COVID-19 pandemic, you may still be eligible, so please enquire if you are interested.
