# What are we waiting for??

***'Wait for the Lord; be strong and take heart  
and wait for the Lord' Psalm 27***

I have wandered through 2021 waiting patiently..... how about you? Waiting for big decisions to be made, waiting for small events to come, waiting for future plans to crystallize: waiting for the gas man, waiting for the parcel delivery, and of course waiting for the end to lockdowns, for the 'all-clear' from Covid-19. I'm sure we have all been waiting hopefully and expectantly for that good news. Yet as I write, the world faces a new virulent strain of Coronavirus. Dark times beckon again. The disappointment runs deep and the fearful worry among people is palpable. We'll simply have to patiently wait this one out...again.

Advent is the supreme time of waiting, especially for Christians. In the northern hemisphere it arrives at the darkest time of the year in late Autumn and Winter. So, we mark the weeks of waiting using light. We light candles on the Advent Wreath, we light candles on our Christingles, we candle-light our Church Services, we light up our homes, we light up Kimpton.

Candlelight gives that warm, gentle, glowing, safe feeling as it keeps darkness at bay. Candle light gives a small pool of light, just enough to move a few steps forward at a time in the darkness. Waiting for the Lord Jesus is a bit like that. As we wait together in Advent, we can find new insights, not only into our faith, our God, but from helping each other. And so, we move a few paces forward in our journey...just as far as that new enlightenment illuminates ...and then we are called to be strong, take heart and wait some more.

But what are we waiting for? Why the Christ child of course! God waits patiently, endlessly, eternally for us to make a new relationship with him. Then in love God sends us his Son Jesus Christ as the most vulnerable example of humankind: a new-born baby. Then God waits some more. God never forgets us... *'we are engraved upon the palms of his hands'*. Give new meaning to the waiting by not worrying about getting Christmas *'right or perfect'* but by being strong, taking heart and waiting for the Lord God to break again into human history this Christmas.

Being strong, taking heart and waiting is very tough when the darkness closes in. Waiting for good news this December may be tough. Even so, don't give up hope. Stop and light a candle this Advent. Let that candle shed a small pool of light to guide your steps a few at a time so that you slow down, wait and appreciate the people and the scenery (and the Services) on the way. Pray to your God for one another, your family and friends and neighbours and even those you don't know. And will be praying for you.

With all blessings to you and yours for a happy Christmas and I hope and pray for a better 2022 for us all.

The council's attention now turns to considering the relative merits of installing some outdoor fitness equipment on the lower level of the Recreation Ground, following a request from some residents earlier this year. ### It's now even greener in Peters Green

The council recently funded the planting of some new trees on the village green in Peters Green, and the project is now complete following the installation of a new circular bench around the silver birch. ### James Marshall Foundation now covers Kimpton

James Marshall Foundation is a charity based in Harpenden that has been operating since 1722. When he left his gift in his will, I'm sure James Marshall could have never imagined that, in the last six years alone, the Trustees would have awarded grants of more than £1 million.

The foundation provides grants for educational and career-related items/activities to young people aged under 25 years, although priority is given to those aged 16 years and over. Previously they could only support applicants living in Harpenden and Wheathampstead but have recently extended their catchment area to also cover Kimpton, Redbourn, Markyate and Flamstead. This is a very positive development for our community, and I'd like to thank the foundation for extending their generous support of young people. ### A reminder to report fly-tipping

Fly-tipping is the term used to describe waste illegally dumped on land and can range from a single black rubbish bag to multiple loads of construction waste. As I'm sure you've seen, this is sadly increasingly common on the lanes around Kimpton.

It's quick and easy to do online, and locations can be identified using What3Words. North Hertfordshire District Council treat fly tipping very seriously and will prosecute anyone caught. ## Reflecting on an important month for the environment

This month saw two momentous environmental landmarks – the United Nations COP26 Climate Conference in Glasgow and the passage of the Environment Act 2021 into law.

As the Chair of the All-Party Parliamentary Group for Renewable and Sustainable Energy it was a great privilege to attend COP26. It was as inspiring as it was sobering. I had a packed schedule: observing diplomatic negotiations, meeting with NGOs and renewable energy companies, hosting roundtable discussions with climate policy experts and colleagues from different political parties and Parliaments, and – the big event for me - chairing a cross-party panel event on Parliamentary consensus-building as part of the Green Zone's official programme.



COP has made some huge progress – more than 90% of the global economy is now signed up to Net Zero; action to halt and reverse deforestation by 2030 has been agreed; and we now have commitments to cut methane, make clean technology cheaper, accelerate the transition to clean energy, protect nature, improve the sustainability of agriculture, and more.

The Glasgow Climate Pact, which – with all the will in the world – should be enough to keep 1.5 degrees alive, delivers on a wide range of binding new measures and, crucially, identifies funding for a number of vitally important projects to advance Net Zero. It is a great tribute to the personal dedication and hard work of COP President Rt Hon Alok

Sharma MP that we have been able to achieve these outcomes. In the months ahead, we will continue to rapidly implement the UK's green industrial revolution, helping vulnerable communities, decarbonising our economy, eliminating coal, shifting to renewables, mobilising green finance and investing in irreplaceable natural capital.

This month the Environment Act also passed into law, giving our local environment stronger, lasting protections. Having sat on the Bill Committee for this important piece of legislation, I have been working hard to ensure that it delivers in a way that is realistic and pragmatic. The Act delivers on improved air and water quality, reduced waste and support for biodiversity. It also gives our police greater ability to tackle fly-tipping, which is something I have been pushing for.

The Act also ensures there is a legal duty on water companies to progressively reduce the adverse impact of sewage discharges on the environment and public health, something that I know local residents care deeply about. Regrettably, we cannot fix decades of under-investment overnight with a blanket ban on sewage discharges - however much we might wish to do so. I believe that these new measures will provide protection for our natural environment and chalk streams in a way that is feasible, and does not create the undesirable risk of sewage being discharged into the street instead during extreme rain.

# Back with a bang

**Friday April 29<sup>th</sup> to Monday 2<sup>nd</sup> May 2022**

We're back!!!! Or rather we sincerely hope to be back in 2022 with the 56<sup>th</sup> May Festival, after an enforced 2 year break because of the pandemic and our theme will be "Back with a bang" – interpret that in any way you like but no fireworks please!

I am aware that many people have moved into the village during the last 2 years who will have no idea as to what this village can do when it comes to having fun and raising money for a variety of good causes. As a result of the last May Festival in 2019 and despite the bad weather, we still managed to donate in excess of £12,000 to a variety of good causes; in 2018 it was £17,000.

The May Festival began in 1965 as a one day event on the first Saturday in May to raise money towards repairs to the church roof and over the decades has grown to an event that starts on Friday evening and ends on Monday afternoon over the early May Bank Holiday weekend. The events include (but are not limited to) a procession of floats along the High Street to the Recreation Ground, a fete with a variety of events in an arena including maypole dancing; cream teas, a junior football tournament, dog show, wine tasting, fun run for both juniors and adults, an auction, grand draw, car boot sale, variety show, open air cinema and much more. There is also the Kimpton Art Show in the church over the weekend (run by a separate committee) and the Parish Church Restoration Trust benefits from both the Art Show and May Festival.

However, for the May Festival to be a success and enjoyable for all, we need volunteers to help organise and run the myriad of events. Some of the former committee members and volunteers have decided that they have done their bit and it's time for some new blood and some new ideas so if you would like to get involved in any way or find out a bit more, please get in touch.

Areas where we are particularly in need of help are with the organising of the May Monarch, the Fun Run, the Variety Show, the Auction and all the mundane but very necessary tasks of writing risk assessments, getting a road closure for the procession, organising the insurance, waste collection, First Aid and so on; all things that go on in the background that are needed to put on a safe and successful event.

Please give some thought to how you could help either in advance or over the weekend because without some more volunteers, some of the events just won't happen next year as the existing committee also want to enjoy the weekend and not run themselves ragged.

**There continue to be issues below affecting personal, vehicle and property safety so do please take time to read them.**

### **Local Crime and Safer Neighbourhood Policing**

During the last few months it has continued to be a relatively quiet time but there have been incidents relating to scams, motor vehicle theft, theft of property from motor vehicles and some drug possession.

In terms of locally generated crime if you are a victim of, or a witness to, an incident which you feel is serious enough, do report it immediately to Hitchin Police Station using 101 and ask for a Crime Number.

We remind you that our Hitchin Rural officers are Ward Constable Gary Pugsley and PCSO Heather Burrows who can be contacted via the automated control at County HQ on 01707 354192 or use the e-mail addresses inside the back cover of this magazine.

### **OWL (Online Watch Link)**

We particularly want more of you to join the growing numbers of residents benefitting from the receipt of police crime alerts direct by e-mail or telephone. Hertfordshire OWL membership is currently 162,000 but we want to increase that so please tell your friends and neighbours about it and urge them to join.

Joining is simple by contacting [www.owl.co.uk](http://www.owl.co.uk), our Ward Coordinators (listed below), or our Watch Liaison Officer Verity Soued on [wlo@herts.pnn.police.uk](mailto:wlo@herts.pnn.police.uk).

It is important that we maintain the records as up to date as possible to maximise the benefit of NHW within the community. We are always looking for Street Coordinators to each cover a small number of houses. They will maintain the details of new households and amendments as well as keeping an eye on any vulnerable people who also may not have access to OWL on the internet.

### **Scams continue to be a big problem. Typical ones in circulation today are :**

1. Scammers posing as Police Officers/Staff/ Banking Officials.
2. HMRC monies owing or refunds
3. Post office/ courier texts demanding payment for wrong postage. - This is a double

scam whereby payment is demanded to redeliver a parcel. Then a few days later the victim is called by a scammer purporting to be from their bank, and they are told they were victim of a scam (which they were), but because this is the truth the victim believes them and then potentially parts with further money via a Push Payment.

4. Amazon prime accounts

5. Courier Fraud - when a victim (often elderly or MH concerns) will be contacted and told they need to move their money out of their account as they have been subject to a scam/ investigation. They then arrange to meet with that individual to collect the money they take out of the account. With large unusual payments or requests to take money out of a branch, the Banking Protocol will be enacted by banking staff whom inform the Police of potentially fraudulent activity

6. Phone calls from Visa card fraud department continue to be a feature, Involving cash transfers from your account.

The caller asks you to call them if you have not made the transaction. This is a scam, just end the call immediately.

### **Vehicle and Contents Theft**

Countywide there continues to be prevalence of these crimes so always lock your car and set the alarm and don't leave any valuables, Satnavs or Dash Cams on display.

There is an outbreak of theft of catalytic converters particularly from Hybrid cars, even in daylight, where the thieves profit from the sale of the precious metal content. Take special precautions such as parking in a garage or close to a wall, fit CCTV to your home, have fixing bolts welded or fit a dealer supplied security cover. It is also possible to etch or forensically mark the converter and use a windscreen sticker to advertise this.

Hertfordshire Constabulary has teamed up with garages around the county to offer free catalytic converter security marking. Security marking can help to deter thieves.
