

# Summer-Back with a Bang!



We are blessed that the Summer season is back with a bang. Don't you agree the 2022 May Festival was definitely back with a bang? The sun shone (thank you Lord God!), the crowds came and there were many happy smiling faces. The Sunday open air May Festival Songs of Praise service was a hit with everyone who came along. A collective sigh of relief that this year Covid-19 did not entirely defeat

everything and everyone's plans. As we enjoy this Summer's festivals, I thought I'd tell you about Festival Church. Yes, the Church does festivals and parties too! Who knew!

Most often festival church comes about when a church building is not used for Sunday services any more but is still highly valued and wanted by its village or community. So we're talking about a church whose future is uncertain, because there are no people or anyone to run it anymore. That's not the case in Kimpton. However, St Lawrence's Ayot St Lawrence now operates as a festival church.

What exactly does that mean? The answer is that the church stays open. Open during the day for visitors and worshippers. It serves the village as a place for prayer and contemplation and for christenings, weddings and funerals. There must be a minimum of 6 services a year (St Lawrence's has 12). These will all be flexible and varied services celebrating big festivals. What are those? At St Lawrence's we have Village Christmas Carol Service with mince pies and mulled wine; Harvest Supper Party, Pancakes for Lent, Mothering Sunday posies, Easter Garden making and lambs to pet. St Lawrence Day falls in August and has picnics, open air concerts, flea circus and Punch and Judy show. There are many interactive and fun ways of celebrating festivals in a Festival Church.



A Festival Church is a community space and can accommodate appropriate complementary community, cultural and commercial uses. This means encouraging the use of the church for events such as village meetings, children's parties and even Art Shows! St Lawrence's has been used as a film venue, drumming school, drama productions, concerts and even a temporary base for visitors from the 501<sup>st</sup> UK Garrison Stormtroopers. All great festivals!



Some of these festivals are happening at Kimpton Church too—in early June I blessed 16 dogs, 4 guinea pigs and Tommy the tortoise. *(see page 3)* 

Watch out for these 'different' church festival events-they are usually advertised around the villages. Let's hope and pray that Covid-19 allows us to continue to celebrate a Summer that is back UK Garrison members with a bang.

# **Meet the New Head**

Our roving reporter went down to Kimpton Primary School to meet *John Ferguson*, who took over as Head at Easter, and this is what they talked about.

# Mr Ferguson, thank you very much for giving up part of your busy day to talk to the Parish Magazine. Could you start by telling us a little bit about yourself?

I was brought up not far away in Old Welwyn and went to St Mary's Primary School, where my mother was a teacher, and then to Monk's Walk in WGC. I started teaching at a private school in Hertford, where I specialised in sport and became Head of PE. Then I moved to Beijing to help establish a brand new mixed primary and secondary school. I became Deputy Head and stayed for a couple of years, after which I came back to Hertfordshire and

worked in two mainstream junior schools before finally coming to Kimpton as Mrs Clements' Deputy and succeeding her earlier this year.

## And why did you become a teacher?

In some ways, it's quite odd that I did. I never really enjoyed school. There were only two teachers I really connected with. But I went to the US to work with inner-city children in Philadelphia, and found that so rewarding and enjoyable that I decided to come back to the UK and train as a teacher. I liked working with children so much that I overcame my dislike of school, and here I am running one!

# Everyone was really pleased with the school's OFSTED rating before Christmas. Was it a surprise?

No. It was a relief, and a recognition of the journey the school community has been on for the last six years, but not a surprise. Well before the visit, the whole community was confident that the school was good. But we weren't complacent, and of course the inspection was nerve-wracking and exhausting, so nothing will ever beat hearing the lead inspector say that the school is good and one she'd be happy for her children to attend.

# What do you enjoy most about working in Kimpton?

This is going to be a long answer! Let's start with the children and their families; it's great to work in a school where I've got to know all the children and their families, and where's there's such an amazing level of support and encouragement from parents individually and through our active PTA.

Then there's the wider community, which supports us in so many ways. There are individuals such as Andy Morton who are always prepared to come and help and our facilities wouldn't be anywhere near as good as they are without the contribution of the Bench Working Party.

Our governors are a real "critical friend" of the school; they ask uncomfortable questions and push for improvements, but that's how it should be. They also contribute expertise in areas like finance, HR, facilities, marketing, website management and publicity that we need to make the school a success, but teachers are never taught.

Most important of all are the staff; they're a massive reason why I wanted to move up to be Head here. Their passion and dedication to developing the school and keeping the children at the centre of everything we do are inspiring. Yes, we got a "good" OFSTED rating, but no one is sitting still and we all want to move on and make the school an even better place for our children to learn and develop.

The whole school fizzes with ideas; for example, our pupil diversity group has some really thoughtful ideas around ways of reminding us of the whole spectrum of people and that our school doesn't necessarily reflect the outside world. I hope the whole community sees me as someone who's willing to listen to and learn from their ideas. *turn to page 6* 

# from page 5 What's the biggest challenge facing the school?

We need to maintain our good standard and build on it, developing the school to be an even better experience for our children. We also need to increase our numbers. A small school is great and having more children can bring its own issues, but funding follows children and, if we want to be a strong and stable school and do all the things we want to, we do need to grow.

### Can you tell us what's been happening in school this term?

Let's start with the Jubilee. For the first time in two years the whole school could be together for our celebrations. It's the same with Sports Day, where we can invite parents to watch the whole event. It's just great to be getting back to normal school life again.

The Summer Term is always tinged with sadness as we say "Goodbye" to Year 6. They'll have their Leavers Assembly and their Adventure Week in Norfolk. They always remind us of our school motto "Achieving Today; Ready for Tomorrow". Most of our leavers go on to Katherine Warrington School, and we've met with the staff there who say how ready for the next stage in their life Kimpton children are when they arrive.

It's also a time to take stock. We have SATS and other assessments and write reports for the children. For ourselves we write the SIP (School Improvement Plan) and reflect on the year that's ending and where we should be looking to take the school next year.

### Who's your role model?

My parents. My father was an engineer and my mother a teacher. They were both grafters, who showed me that life isn't always easy and you need to put the work in. You won't always get what you want, but if you want something you need to work and go out to get it. That's very much what I try to do as a parent myself, trying to stress the importance of drive, work ethic and passion. They also taught me that compassion, openness, and a good sense of humour are vital to make it through life.

### How can our readers help you and your colleagues and support the school?

We're always looking for volunteers who can come in to hear children read. And people with a skill or an interest they could show and tell; art and music are the obvious ones, but anything that's different, that we wouldn't have ourselves and you'd be happy to share. Also, outside the classroom practical skills we can call on (like plumbing, electrics, gardening, maintenance) so we can improve our environment in ways we couldn't afford commercially. 

# Have you ever wondered how your donation money is spent? When you pop your donation in the Poppy appeal tin- or now swipe your debit card on the machine- where does it go?

The RBL supports both serving and and ex- serving personel- for the rest of their lives if they need it. The list of support offered is endless but recently we had experience of a scheme that I never

# ROYAL BRITISH LECION knew existed.

The RBL run a telephone buddy scheme- it offers companionship, support and a friendly ear to anyone who is feeling lonely or isolated. At the start of Lockdown, my husband John volunteered to become a phone buddy. After initial training he was put in touch with a 96-year-old lady who had been one of the first women to join the RAF during WW2. Obviously, she was unable to meet with anyone due to the Covid Restrictions, so Johns weekly phone calls soon became very important to her. He would be on the phone for three hours or so!!! She is very engaging and interesting, so he also found the calls extremely worthwhile. They carried on with their weekly calls throughout the pandemic. He would often come away from the call chuckling at her tales of being a young woman in the RAF but also listened when she talked of her current feelings of isolation and sadness.

Then in April the sun came out and we went to visit Maureen at her home in Hertfordshire. It was quite emotional when the two of them met in person for the first time and she spoke fondly of how John's support and calls had helped her during those awful times. There are just over twenty of us, all male except one very brave female, average age the wrong side of seventy. We meet weekly to do all sorts of jobs around the village, and help out at village events as well. The jobs we have been engaged in recently include - preparing and then oiling the beautiful old Church external doors, planting about 1000 young trees around the Parkfield Rec car park and down the track towards the Hitchin road, cleaning off and repairing the soffits and barge boards of Church House, then painting them with, hopefully long lasting, paint.

# Responding to being sanctioned by Russia

I have been informed that I have been sanctioned by the Russian Government for my role in the UK's response to the Russian invasion of Ukraine. These

sanctions will prevent me from any travel to or dealings with Russia.

This comes after I have played a leading role in the sanctions regime placed on Russian oligarchs and those with links to the Russian regime in my capacity as Chair of the All-Party Parliamentary Group for Financial Markets and Services. I have also worked closely with Ministers on support for Ukraine and Ukrainian nationals seeking safety from the war in Ukraine.

I am proud of my tough stance against Russian aggression in Ukraine and the role that I have played, working with Ministerial colleagues, on the UK's sanctions regime. I am currently working closely with the Government and cross-party colleagues on the second Economic Crime Bill, which will come to Parliament in the summer. Together with colleagues I am working to ensure that it is extremely tough on corrupt dirty money from Russia and elsewhere.

We must continue to enforce our punitive sanctions against Russia, depriving Putin and his cronies of money stolen from the Russian people. This money should be paying for the healthcare and education of Russian people, but it is now funding the very bombs dropping on hospitals and schools in cities across Ukraine.

I regard being sanctioned by the criminal gang masquerading as the Russian Government to be a badge of pride.
