Launch of *Our Watch website's* new look this week

The Our Watch website is getting a refreshed look this month, with a few changes to how the website looks, and where you can find information. Visit our website from 6th June to enjoy the new look!

All of our crime prevention information and resources will stay in the same place, but lots of the resources for volunteers will be moving to the Knowledge Hub.

The new look includes a more streamlined menu, designed to provide a smoother journey for visitors. Information on crime prevention, community wellbeing, and safety should be easier to find, thanks to our intuitive search bar, and cleaner homepage layout. We've used a wider range of colours from our brand palette, and have run several accessibility tests during the design process to ensure that people can enjoy a smooth experience when visiting Our Watch. We've highlighted impact stories from communities across England and Wales, demonstrating the brilliant work of our volunteers, and have given greater focus on opportunities for new partners and organisations to work with our charity. We rely on voluntary donations to support the work of our volunteers in their communities, and so we have made it easier for people to donate.

Six home safety tips for summer

Summer is the season of relaxation, for spending time with family and friends and holidaying to your favourite destinations. Whilst these things are great for the soul, you'll want to ensure home security doesn't slip your mind.

Here are our top six home security tips for summer so you can enjoy the warmer months and have extra peace of mind.

Install a home security system

Don't have one yet? A home security system is your first port of call. Your security system doesn't have to be grandiose, particularly if you're on a budget, but it's something you could build and maintain over time to keep your home safe in the summer.

Check the integrity of doors and windows

Are the locks on your doors and windows working correctly? Any loose screws or misaligned pieces could make your entry points vulnerable to a break-in, so get those fixed as soon as possible. It goes without saying that if you plan on going out for the day, ensure all of your windows and doors are locked properly - it never hurts to double or triple-check!

Don't neglect your garden

To reinforce garden security, check out the hedges, fencing, tools, and shed (if you have one). Is your shed locked? Are tools stowed away so they can't be used to break into your home? Are your hedges high enough to put off people peering into your property? Can I cover blind spots or get a bigger picture view with an outdoor camera? These are all questions you can ask yourself to ensure your garden is as safe as possible.

Keep parcels and letters in check

A build-up of parcels and letters at your home is a surefire way to advertise no one's home. Instead, you could arrange for parcels to be directed elsewhere, such as a place of work or to a trusted family member. You could even ask a Neighbour to keep an eye out for your delivery. Alternatively, you could rebook your delivery for a time you'll be home.

Be careful what you post on social media

If you have a public account and post snaps on holiday, you're essentially advertising that you're not home. Or, say you are home, but you've posted a picture that shows where you might live. A criminal could use this insight into your social media life to target your home. Be mindful of what and when you post, or you could also change your social profile's privacy settings. However, joining a local community or Neighbourhood Watch Facebook group could be a great way to keep an eye on what's happening in the local area, especially if you're on holiday.

Practice barbecue safety

If you're the chief griller on the barbecue, be extra careful with safety for yourself and your home this summer. For example, keep your barbecue away from flammable materials such as wooden sheds or fencing and dispose of coal and ash once it has cooled, not right after you've finished barbecuing.
